Mission:

The purpose of the Dr. Maureen Duffy Family Enrichment Center is twofold: (1) to provide counseling services to the community on a sliding fee basis; and (2) provide on-site training to Barry University Counseling program students, the mental health leaders of the future. The Center supports the initiative of Barry University in extending a helping hand, through professional services, to the community. Clients are seen by treatment teams under faculty supervision to maximize the delivery of quality clinical services. Therapy services focus on enhancing clients' strengths and resources.

Operations:

As a service and training center, counseling services are provided by interns and practicum students who are completing a Master's or Ph.D. degree in Counseling. These counselors in training are supervised by the full-time faculty members of the Barry University Counseling Program, including Licensed Family and Mental Health Counselors. The Clinic is fully equipped with state of the art audio / video systems to facilitate live supervision and supervision of supervision.

Range of Services:

Our services are offered to clients from preschool through late adulthood. The Clinic services include individual, family, marital and couples counseling.

Fee Schedule:

Client counseling session costs are based on a sliding scale fee.

Appointments:

The center is open Monday through Thursday from 3:00 to 10:00 P.M. Appointments are made by contacting the Dr. Maureen Duffy Family Enrichment Center in Miami Shores at 305-899-3726.

Service Limitations:

The Dr. Maureen Duffy Family Enrichment Center does not provide: a) emergency services; b) drug detoxification counseling; or c) care for those with acute mental illnesses. Those requiring these critical care services are referred to the appropriate facilities in the area.

Barry University-College Reach-Out Program (CROP)

The College Reach-Out Program (CROP) was established in 1983 by the Florida Department of Education to motivate and prepare educationally disadvantaged, low income students in grades 6 through 12 to pursue and successfully complete a college education. Barry University is the first and only Florida CROP program to provide individual, family, and group therapeutic counseling services to its participants.



In addition, Barry University Counseling Department has been awarded 2010-2011 Funding from Florida Department of Education for **Mentoring and Student Assistance Initiatives**, which significantly enhances the CROP program by supporting the schools and communities, help students remain connected to the classroom and ultimately raise their personal level of performance; and remove barriers to learning.

Moreover, during 2010 the Counseling Department received funds from **Wells Fargo Bank- Harry Kramer Memorial Fund** to provide educational enrichment services for CROP participants to engage them in research, math, literacy and writing skills.

Our mission is to provide counseling, leadership, mentoring, and tutoring services to strengthen students' emotional, cognitive, and behavioral skills to enhance academic and personal achievement.

PROGRAM SERVICES

Barry University's CROP Program offers targeted Miami Dade County Public Schools with various services to enhance and enrich participants academically, personally, socially, and culturally.

- **Individual and Group Counseling** to address individual, family, and community barriers which affect personal and academic success.
- **Summer Residential Program** provides CROP high school students (juniors) with a college life experience for one week on college campus.
- **Tutorial Instruction** for reading, literacy, math, and science skills.
- **Mentoring Program** provides middle and high school students the opportunity to be mentored by College students through exposure to college settings and dialogue about college, its barriers, and how to overcome them.
- **Civic Engagement Opportunities** allow middle and high school students to contribute, improve, and make a difference in their communities through various activities such as feeding the homeless, cleaning parks and beaches, planting gardens in local school and neighborhoods.
- **Summer Academic and Wellness Camp** engages middle school students to focus on academic and personal and leadership development skills for one week on a college campus.
- **Workshops** that focus on students' curiosity, imagination, investigation, motivation, leadership and life skills, parental support, school and community engagement, college educational goals, and career opportunities.
- **College Visits and Field Trips** provide students first-hand exposure to colleges, universities, and educational opportunities.
- **Family Counseling** is provided to CROP participants and their families *at no cost* through the Dr. Maureen Duffy Family Enrichment Center at Barry University.

BARRY UNIVERSITY CROP PROGRAM SUCCESS

Through over a decade, our Barry University CROP program has been a proven success.

- During the academic year 2006-2007 and 2008-2009, 100% of CROP students in grades 6 through 11 were promoted to the next grade;
- During 2006-2007 100% of our high school seniors graduated from high school and 100% of these students enrolled in post-secondary education;
- During 2008-2009, 90% of our high school seniors graduated from high school and 100% of these students enrolled in post-secondary education.

CROP FLORIDA STATE PROGRAM SUCCESS

In General, Florida State CROP programs have been a proven success:

- CROP students in grades 6-11 are academically promoted to the next grade at a rate of 90% compared to 83% for the random sample;
- The percentage of CROP 12th grade students receiving standard diplomas ranges from 79 to 88% over the past five years compared to 59 to 67% for the random sample;
- Approximately 82% of CROP graduates were enrolled in postsecondary education, compared to approximately 70% of the random sample in 2008-2009;
- CROP students in grades 6-12, on average, are absent fewer days (8.9) than their random cohort (10.1).
